ed, and ^a new cover spring
furnished.

Saturday, July 3, 1869.

Very warm

I worked all day
in the hop field.

In the morning
Harry and Willy Eaton
cultivated the cornfield
in 3 hours (Paid Willy 15)
afterwards Harry went
to the picnic.

Paid H. ^{W.} White \$1.75 for
shaving sheep one day.

Sunday, July 4, 1869.

Very warm

Rode up to the
pasture in Mexico
and salted the sheep
& cattle.

Monday, July 5, 1869.

Strong cold N. W.
wind.

Worked in the hop
field myself.

Harry & Mr Rose
worked all day hoing
corn and Mr Dillingham
 $\frac{1}{2}$ day.

Paid Tyler H. idder
\$10.00 for 2 pigs (4 weeks
old).

Got at Chase's 100 having
80, and changed the
flour I got June 29th

Mr Chase had my
horse about one hour
to haul sod on bog.

Tuesday, July 6, 1869.

Pleasant

Worked in the
hop field.

Harry and Mr Rose
worked all day hoing
corn and potatoes. Henry
Dillingham $\frac{1}{2}$ day

Harry and Willy Eaton
cultivated the potatoes
this morning in a little
over 2 hours.

Oscar Toak had my
wagon yesterday and
today.

Wednesday, July 7, 1869.

Warm and pleasant
Worked in the hop
field.

Harry finished hoing
the corn and potatoes
to day.

Herri Dillingham
worked with Harry
hoing 4 hours this after-
noon.

Oscar Trask brought
my wagon home about
4 o'clock this afternoon.

Thursday, July 8, 1869.

Pleasant, inclined
to rain in the afternoon.

Cultivated the hops this
forenoon, myself and W. J.
Eaton; Harry and Mr
Rose hoed in the hop field
(in the forenoon)

This afternoon we went
to see a trial of mowing
machines, Buckeye and
Kniffin; Buckeye the
best.

Got at Chasis 12 lbs
sugar @ 1/4- (\$2.00).

Friday, July 9, 1869.

Cloudy, rained in
the afternoon.

Worked in the top
field in the forenoon

Carried 4 doz eggs
to Chas's @ 20 and got
its value in corn.

Saturday, July 10, 1869.

Warm and pleasant

Worked in the top
field putting up vines
Harry being.

Paid Willy Eaton 50
for hiring cultivate
two times (nearly a day)

Tuesday, July 13, 1869.

Warm and pleasant

Worked in the hop field putting out vines, Harry finished hoing in the hop field

Harry got at Chasis one pair suspenders, 90¢

Wednesday, July 14, 1869.

Warm and pleasant

Mowed the orchard and a strip outside.

Went with Tyler Kilder to the Mexico pasture to doctor my beef cow; gave 2 oz saltpeter, drove her home and cut her tail off.

Got at Chasis 1 bush oats

Got at the mill 24 9 ft of $\frac{5}{8}$ spruce bd

Thursday, July 15, 1869.

Cloudy and a little
rainy.

Rigged up the hay
rack and did other jobs
in the barn, mowed
some in the afternoon.

Got at Chase's one paper
Burr's bitters and $\frac{1}{2}$ ptⁿ al-
cohol (55)

Friday, July 16, 1869.

Misty and a little
rainy cleared off
about 4 P.M.

Put up hop vines part
of the day and mowed
some.

Paid Scot Chase for 10 $\frac{1}{2}$
of lavender and 2 oz of
saltpeter (15 $\frac{1}{2}$)

Got at Chase's 1 lb sal-
cratus (15)

Saturday, July 17, 1869.

Good hay day with
strong N. W. wind

Got in the 1st & 2^d loads
of hay.

Sunday, July 18, 1869.

Pesant

Drove the sick cow
to pasture, gave her a
dose of salpiter (2 oz) this
morning; brought back
the heifer calf to be with
Pansy.

Got in the 3rd load
of hay.

Monday, July 19, 1869.

Good hay day

Mowed about an acre this morning. Scott Chase mowed about $1\frac{1}{2}$ acres, and it all cooked except the last mowing done after supper.

Willy Eaton worked for us this afternoon.

My back has been very lame today, and cold I suppose.

Tuesday, July 20, 1869.

Good hay day

Got in the 10th load of hay.

Mr. Rose worked from 10 A.M.

Willy Eaton worked.

Got in all the hay except what Scott mowed towards noon.

Got at Chase's time-tune of rheubarb 20[¢]

Paid Tyler Hilder 80[¢] for 10 lbs beef.

Wednesday, July 21, 1869.

Cloudy and rainy
in the afternoon.

Got in the rest of the
hay this morning, $11\frac{1}{2}$ tons

Mr Rose haxed us this
forenoon mowing

Thursday, July 22, 1869.

Cool N.W. wind

Put up vines in the
hopfield and raked
cocked the grass mowed
yesterday.

Willy Eaton worked
from 9 P.M. to 5 A.M.

Paid \$5 for carding
a bundle of wool (a-
bout $6\frac{1}{2}$ lbs of rolls)

Friday, July 23, 1869.

Good hay day.

Got in the 15^{1/2} load
and cocked the grass
mowed by Scot.

Put up hop vines this
morning.

Bose worked from
10 AM. to 6 PM.

Willy Eaton worked
from 11 AM to 7^{1/2} P.M.

Saturday, July 24, 1869.

Very warm

Got in the 21^{1/2} load
(all the hay ^{that was} out)

Mr Bosc worked
from 10 AM to 4 PM

Willy Eaton worked
from 10 AM to 4 PM.

Paid Nelly Bosc 25[¢] for
helping bake.

Put up hop vines this
morning.

Sunday, July 25, 1869.

Very warm

Went to the pasture
in Mexico and gave
the sick cow a dose
of saltpeter (2 oz)

Cocked the hay Scot
mowed yesterday, tried
Scot's horse rake on it,
don't like it.

Monday, July 26, 1869.

Very warm, had
a little shower shortly
after dinner which
wet about 3 loads of
hay (the first I have
had wet so far)

Rose worked from
6 to 20 m, of 11, and helped
get in one load, after
dinner, (the 2 1/2 load)

Got at Chase's one Gall
molasses (80¢)

Tuesday, July 27, 1869.

Very warm, after
dinner had a shower

Rose helped get in
one load (the 2³/₄ load)
the rest got wet again

Harvey took the team
and helped Rose get in
one load for himself

Got of Cyler Heidder
15³/₄ lbs beef @ 12¢ #189.
(charged)

Wednesday, July 28, 1869.

Very warm, good
hay day.

Got in the 2⁹/₁₁ load

Rose worked this
afternoon.

Finished getting in
the hay this side of
the main ditch.

Thursday, July 29, 1869.

Rainy and showery
most of the day.

Rose helped pitch
off one load.

Fixed a bridge across
the ditch and raked
up the last mowing.

Friday, July 30, 1869.

Cool N. W. wind
had a little sprinkle
from a shower which
passed to the North in
the afternoon.

Got in the 2^d & 3^d load;
the last mowing cocked

Found one of the mows
getting warm, dug
out the middle of it

Saturday, July 31, 1869.

Good hay day

Got in the 29th load

J. Stockbridge worked
to day for us (haying)

Pitched off part of
the mow that was
heating.

Got at Chasis' bush
sold \$1.00 (lacked 6th)

Edmunds set the
horses' shoes all round

Sunday, August 1, 1869.

Warm and pleasant

Monday, August 2, 1869.

Warm and hazy
Got in the 3rd load

J Stockbridge worked
to day haying

Tuesday, August 3, 1869.

Threatened to rain
this morning but
cleared off.

Finished mowing
Stockbridge worked
today from 9 AM.

Wednesday, August 4, 1869.

Pleasant, some
cloudy.

Finished haying
got in the 36th load

Stockbridge worked
this afternoon

Bought oats of Cox @ \$5
per bush (\$1.35)

Bought at Chases 15 lbs
sugar @ 15¢ (\$2.25)

Thursday, August 5, 1869.

Cloudy

Hoed weeds in the
potatoes, Harry piling
the wood.

Friday, August 6, 1869.

Very cool and windy.

Hoed weeds in the hop field, Harry piled wood

Settled all accounts with Stockbridge, paid the balance due him (\$1.21) with butter @ 35¢ - (3½ lbs)

Saturday, August 7, 1869.

Cool and windy with rain squalls

Myself & Harry hoed weeds in the hop field.

We had a view of the of the eclipse between 5 and 6 P.M.

Sunday, August 8, 1869.

Pleasant

Salted the sheep and
cattle in Mexico pasture

Put track in the Mexico
pasture.

Basworth spoke of
changing Bulls with
me

Monday, August 9, 1869.

Warm and pleasant

Harvey and myself hord
in the hop field

Got at Chase's one
Gall molasses 80¢

This evening Ben Beavitt
reported one of his steers
dead, supposed he got
his neck broke in fighting
with my bull.

Tuesday, August 10, 1869.

Very warm and pleasant

Went up this morning
and got the bull home

Harry and myself
had weeds in the hop
field.

Wednesday, August 11, 1869.

Very warm

Finished hoing in
the hop field, also pulled
the climbers out of the
buns in the hop field

In the afternoon tied
up hop vines.

Thursday, August 12, 1869.

Very warm, we
are now having
quite a severe drouth

Harvey and myself
tied up hop vines
the twine has got
rotten and brakes
a great deal, (this
is the second year
of using it).

Friday, August 13, 1869.

Very warm.

Tied up hop vines.

Got at Chasis 6 lbs
sugar @ 1- \$1.00

Paid Freeman Griffith
\$1.00 for a bucket wind-
lass.

Got at Chasis 2 lbs
wool twine (40)

Saturday, August 14, 1869.

Warm and pleasant

Tied up hop vines

Bradley, Sarah and
George arrived this
evening.

Killed a chicken.

Sunday, August 15, 1869.

Rainy day, much
needed.

Went up to the meadow
to see the chance of getting
a few loads of bedding,
did not like it.

Bradley started for home
this afternoon.

Went to see the stock
in Mexico pasture

Monday, August 16, 1869.

Cloudy

Tied up hop vines,
in the afternoon I went
went fishing with De Witt
and George up Webb's ⁱ ~~own~~
(caught no pickerell)

Tuesday, August 17, 1869.

Cloudy

Helped Harry tie
up hop vines an hour
or two and then put
a new bottom in the
farm wagon

Sold my big boots
to Tom Stickney for
\$2.50

Wednesday, August 18, 1869.

Pleasant

Commenced making a hop box

Harry commenced spreading the muck heap on the mow field

Got at Chasis 1 lb saleratus (15¢)

Thursday, August 19, 1869.

Pleasant

Worked on hop box

Harry spreading muck

My wife went this morning to the mineral spring in Peru to camp out with others that are there
Belia carried her.

Friday, August 20, 1869.

Rained all last night and part of the forenoon today (much needed) cleared off hot

Worked on the hop box.

My wife got home this evening and reports that Bradley was thrown from his gig and badly hurt, ^{she} did not learn all the particulars.

Got of Tyler Hidden
18 lbs meat (to corn)
@ 12¢ (\$1.56)

Tuesday, August 24, 1869.

Warm and pleasant
Worked on top box
Harry spreading
muck.

Got of Tyler Hilder
21 lbs of beef @ 4[¢] (84[¢])

Got at Chasis 1 plug
tobacco (20[¢])

Wednesday, August 25, 1869.

Pleasant, had some
rain this afternoon.

Worked on the top
box, Harry spreading
muck.

Thursday, August 26, 1869.

Pleasant, with
quite a strong West
wind

Finished the hop
box.

Harvey finished
spreading manure.

Bickford paid my
bill against him
for bill service the
past year ¹⁸⁶⁹ (\$200)

Friday, August 27, 1869.

Pleasant and windy

E. Novocross put his
cow in my pasture

Harvey hauled manure
in the barn cellar

Marble had $6\frac{1}{4}$ lbs but-
ter of us @ 35¢ (\$2.25)

Saturday, August 28, 1869.

Pleasant, rained
this afternoon.

Mitchell commu-
enced picking hops

Went to the pasture
and got my ram.

Sold my lambs to
Benj^m Leavitt @ \$2.50
apiece reserving my
pick of 3 ewes and one
ram lamb; he paid
\$20.00 down and the
balance when he gets
the lambs (in a week
or two)

Got at Chas's 20 yds
of hop bagging @ 1/4 - \$2.33
& 15 lbs sugar @ 15¢ (\$2.25)

Sunday, August 29, 1869.

Pleasant
had a good rain last
night.

Went to the pasture
and salted the stock.

Monday, August 30, 1869.

Quite cool and
windy.

Took out the chain
pump found the wood
work about the well
all rotten and the
well needs fixing and
cleaning out.

Tuesday, August 31, 1869.

Very cool and
windy for the season

Worked on the well

Harry mowing weeds
in the potatoes and
corn.

The cattle got out
of the pasture and
came out by Taylors

My Wife started with
George and Sarah for
Canton this afternoon.

Wednesday, September 1, 1869.

Cool, windy and
showery squalls in
the afternoon

Harry and myself
cleaned out the well

Got at Chas's 1 gall
molasses

Thursday, September 2, 1869.

Cloudy, with
two or three rain
squalls.

Worked on the well

Borrowed of Rose
 $\frac{1}{2}$ bush corn

Got at Norcross's $\frac{1}{2}$ bush
rye

Harry and Lee
went to the pasture
this forenoon to get
a mass lamb but
did not find him

Friday, September 3, 1869.

Pleasant

Mitchell finished
picking hops

Worked on the well
this forenoon got ready
for picking hops
this afternoon.

Got 2 cords of wood
of L Brackett \$6.00

Got at Chasis 11½
lbs fish @ 9¢ (\$1.05) and
1 bbl flour (\$10.50)

Saturday, September 4, 1869.

Pleasant

Commenced pick-
ing hops with 3 boxes,
4 at a box

The young cattle got
out of the pasture

Got at Chasis 5½ lbs
sugar (\$1.00) 1 lb tea \$1.50
and 10 lbs sulphur (70¢)

Sunday, September 5, 1869.

Very Warm

Drove the young
cattle to pasture, got
all the sheep and lambs
together, found 21 lambs
brought home one weath-
er.

Benⁿ Leavitt paid
\$10.00 more on the lambs
he agrees to make a good
fence between me and Trask
and also repair the brush
fence where needed for
\$12.00

Monday, September 6, 1869.

Very warm

2^d day of hop picking.
had full crew

Tuesday, September 7, 1869.

Very warm, cloudy
in the afternoon with
a little sprinkling

3^d day of hop pick-
ing, had full crew.

Wednesday, September 8, 1869.

Cloudy and threat-
ning rain, rained in
the morning and was
very hard this evening.

The young cattle got
out and we drove them
to pasture this afternoon

Did not pick hops today

Thursday, September 9, 1869.

Windy

4th day of hop picking
had a full crew

Discovered today that
the most of the hops
have begun to mould
evidently caused by
the last two days of
hot damp weather

Friday, September 10, 1869.

Cloudy

5th day of hop pick-
ing, had a full crew
lacking one

We had to leave a-
bout $\frac{1}{2}$ of the hills
today in consequence
of mould

Saturday, September 11, 1869.

Pleasant

6th day of hop
picking, had 5 to
box

Sunday, September 12, 1869.

Warm and pleasant,
almost a frost last night

Finished hop picking
this noon.

Harry carried home
the Coburn girls this
afternoon.

Paid the ^{two} Coburn girls
for 6½ days work, 50¢ per
day & board (\$ 6.50)

the premises

Got in the oats (2 loads)

Paid Mrs Eaton for
hop picking & Willy for
haying. (\$ 6.62)

Paid Mary Mitchell
and her mother for
hop picking (\$ 5.25)

Put up a post under
the sheep shed.

Harry commenced
a ditch this forenoon
running N. & S. across the
East edge of the field,
designed to be the main
ditch; he went with his
mother and others black
berrying this afternoon.

& $\frac{1}{4}$ lb allspice (30¢) & one
Gall molasses (80¢)

Picking hops.

in the afternoon.

Worked on the well

Harry commenced
shooking the corn

Got in the peas

Paid Sarah Hiddor
\$2.25 for picking hops

Got @ Chase's 2 qt
kerosene 30¢ chimney
wick 2

Sunday, September 26, 1869.

Cloudy raining in
the afternoon

Visited the stock in
the pasture and also
S Griffith's cranberry
dam

Monday, September 27, 1869.

Cold rain, rained
all last night, cleared
off cold this noon with
N.W. wind.

Worked on the well

Harry stacked corn
this afternoon

Got at Cox's 1 pr W^m boots
\$2.00

Tuesday, September 28, 1869.

Clear, cold N.W.
wind.

Worked on the well

Harry finished stack-
ing the corn.

Got at Chasis 1 paper
matchess (60¢)

Marble took his
cow out of my pasture

Levabee took his young
cattle out of my pasture

Wednesday, September 29, 1869.

Warm and pleasant

Had a frost last night; the first of the season in this locality

Worked on the well

Harry worked on the ditch

Thursday, September 30, 1869.

Warm and pleasant

Worked some on the well.

Had the oats thrashed (2 loads, 20 bush^{es})

Friday, October 1, 1869.

Very warm for the season.

Finished the well

Harry commenced digging the potatoes.

Got ad Chasis's $2\frac{1}{4}$ lbs rope @ $2\ 3\ 4$ (63 $\frac{1}{4}$)

Paid Willey Eaton $2\ 5\ 4$ for hunting for calves (this pays him all up)

Saturday, October 2, 1869.

Very warm

Bailed out the well could not bail it lower ^{than} the (bottom pinched) took from morning to 3 in the afternoon

Dug the Harrison potatoes, about 10 bush; a great many showed rot (about $\frac{1}{3}$); potatoes in this locality are very light this season and show a great deal of rot.

Got in a load of corn and husked 3 bush

Sunday, October 3, 1869.

Rained all day

Monday, October 4, 1869.

Rained very hard last night and all this day, which has caused the greatest freshet here within the remembrance of anyone now living here; a great amount of damage has been done.

Did some jobs indoors

Tuesday, October 5, 1869.

Cleared off cold
and windy.

The vesket has caused
a great amount of
damage on swift
river and to the saw
mill at this place &c

Spent most of the day
looking at the workings
of the waters.

Got at Stanley's one
umbrella \$1.62

Wednesday, October 6, 1869.

Cold and windy

Did jobs about the
house and barn

Harry worked on the
ditch.

Got at Chase's one
lantern \$1.12 1/2

Paid Lee Dillingham
25 for hunting the calves
(this pays him in full
to date).

Thursday, October 7, 1869.

Warm and pleasant

Harry and I worked
all day on the road
for the town

Got at Chase's one
pint of whale oil 25

Friday, October 8, 1869.

Warm and pleasant

Harry and I worked
all day on the road
for the town

Got at Chase's one Gall
molasses (.80)

Saturday, October 9, 1869.

Warm and pleasant

Harry and I worked
on the road in the fore-
noon, in the afternoon
got in corn.

Sunday, October 10, 1869.

Pleasant, this after-
noon cloudy and threat-
ning rain.

Visited the Mexico pasture.

Got in the rest of the
corn.

The cattle got out of
the Mexico pasture this
evening; Wid Brackett found
them up street and drove
them here.

Monday, October 11, 1869.

Rained hard this morning cleared off at noon.

Drove the cattle back and fixed the fence

Helped Ben Leavitt get the lambs in the afternoon, Harry husked corn.

Tuesday, October 12, 1869.

Warm and pleasant

Husked corn, dug a few potatoes, and got in the pumpkins.

Harry worked all day on the road for the town.

Wednesday, October 13, 1869.

Rained all day

Harry and I husked
corn all day

Edmunds sold the
horse's shoes all round

Sold my hops to Tho:
Reynolds @ 12¢ per pound
except one bail @ 8¢ per
pound; received \$25. of
Reynolds on this trade

Thursday, October 14, 1869.

Cleared off cold, warm
in the afternoon, rains
this evening.

Harry and team worked
on the road all day for
the town.

Worked on the ditch.

Got at Chas's 35 yd
bailing cloth @ 23¢ (\$8.05)

Friday, October 15, 1869.

Cloudy, rained a little in the afternoon

Baled the hops, had 7 bales; (6 weighed 126 lbs and 1 weighed 215 lbs)

0 Trask charges \$2.50 for his work and use of the press.

Got at Cox's 6 1/2 lbs rope @ 28¢ (\$1.82)

Saturday, October 16, 1869.

Rained last night and all day to day.

Finished hucking the corn had 60 bushels

Got at Chase's one plug tobacco 20¢

Sunday, October 17, 1869.

Cleared off cold

Got a sheep from
the pasture to kill,
also separated Ben
Leavitts lambs from
my sheep, left them
in the pen, and notified
him of it.

Randall took his
calves out of the
pasture.

Monday, October 18, 1869.

Cloudy in the after-
noon with a little
rain squall.

Harry dug potatoes

I worked on the ditch
