- 2 A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, January 31st, invisible in U. S.
- 3 A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, June 28th, invisible in U. S.
- 4 A Total Eclipse of the Moon, July 12th, invisible in U. S.
- 5 A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, July 28th, invisible in U. S.
- 6 A Total Eclipse of the Sun, December 22d, invisible in U. S.

MORNING STARS.

Venus from Feb. 23d to Dec. 8th. Mars from March 12th to Dec. 16th. Jupiter from May 24th to Sep. 18th. Saturn until March 18th

EVENING STARS.

Venus until Feb. 23d. Mars until March 12th. Jupiter until May 24th, and after Sep. 18th. Saturn from March 18th to Dec. 22d.

Stamp Duties.

In all cases, the person using or affixing the stamp shall write upon it the initials of his name, and the date when used, so that it may not again be used, under a penalty of \$200.

A Power of Attorney accompanying a bond or note requires no additional stamp.

A Bond or Note secured by mortgage requires but one stamp for all the documents: such stamp, however, is to be of the highest rate required for either of said instruments.

The party to whom a document is issued from a foreign country, or by whom it is to be used, shall before using the same, affix thereon the stamp or stamps indicating the duty required.

No conveyance, deed, mortgage, or writing shall be required to pay a stamp duty of more than \$1,000.

Assignment of Lease must bear same stamp as original lease, and, in addition, a stamp for the consideration of the assignment at same rate as stamp on deed.

Penalty recoverable from any Telegraph Company for receiving or transmitting any message without the proper adhesive stamp being affixed to a written copy thereof, \$10.

EXEMPTIONS.—No stamp duty shall be required on powers of attorney or any other paper relating to applications for bounties, arrearages of pay, or pensions, or to the receipt thereof from time to time; nor on any warrant of attorney accompanying a bond or note, when such bond or note shall have affixed thereto the stamp or stamps denoting the duty required; nor on certificates of the measurement or weight of animals, wood, coal, or other articles, nor on deposit notes to mutual insurance companies for insurance upon which policies subject to stamp duties have been or are to be issued; nor on any certificate of the record of a deed or other instrument in writing, or of the acknowledgment or proof thereof by attesting witnesses; nor upon affidavits in a suit where the summons has been stamped; nor upon an endorsement of any negotiable instrument.

MONEY can be sent with absolute safety by mail by procuring a Money Order. The fees are, for \$1 to \$10, ten cents; \$20 to \$50, twenty-five cents.

CIRCULARS, unsealed, not exceeding three in number, to one address, 2 cents; the same rate for every three or less number additional.

PRINTED BOOKS, in one package, to one address, 4 cents for each four ounces or fraction thereof.

On all **TRANSIENT NEWSPAPERS**, or other **PRINTED MATTER** (Books and Circulars excepted), and on all Seeds, Cuttings, &c., Pamphlets, Book Manuscripts and Proof Sheets, Maps, Engravings, Blanks, Patterns, Envelopes, and Photographs, contained in one package, to one address, 2 cents for each four ounces or fraction thereof.

All Transient Matter, except duly certified letters of Soldiers and Sailors, must be prepaid by Stamps.

On all matter not above specified, same rate as letters.

No package will be forwarded which weighs over four pounds, except books published or circulated by order of Congress.

FOREIGN.

On **LETTERS TO GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND**. For every half ounce or fraction thereof, 12 cents if prepaid. If not prepaid, 12 cents extra will be collected in Great Britain, and 5 cents in the United States.

To the **GERMAN STATES**. For every half ounce or fraction thereof via North German Union direct, 10 cents; closed mail via England, 15 cents; pre-payment optional.

To **FRANCE**, 15 cents for each quarter ounce or fraction thereof; pre-payment optional.

To **THE DOMINION OF CANADA**, per half ounce, any distance, 6 cents if prepaid; if not paid, 10 cents.

To other **BRITISH NORTH AMERICAN PROVINCES** not over 3,000 miles, 10 cents per half ounce; over 3,000 miles, 15 cents per half ounce. Pre-payment compulsory.

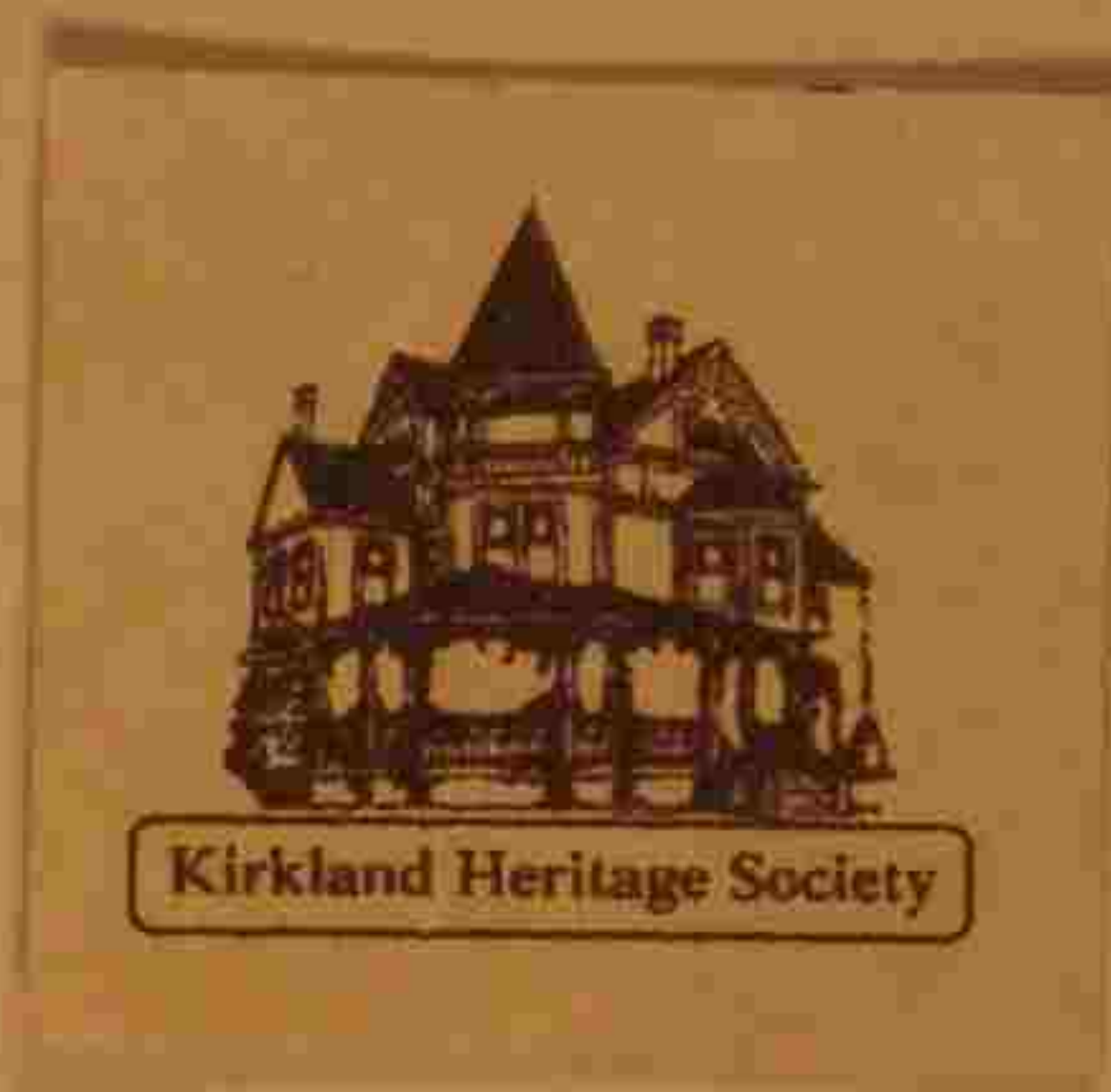
